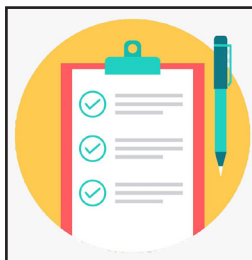


ESD volunteers picked up

144 erosion control inspections

were performed by the City to ensure that construction sites had **proper stormwater management practices.**

1,409.85 tons

of trash & debris was collected during street sweeping in 2022. That's about **320 adult elephants** worth of trash and debris that was kept out of our local waterways.

The City identified and eliminated

4 illicit discharges

(not including grass clipping violations). **Illicit discharges** are inputs to the stormwater system that are not rain, like sewage or chemical spills, and are prohibited.
